Mississippi Short-term Occupational Employment Projections for 2021-2023 were produced over a period from December 2021-early March 2022. These statewide projections are made based on procedures, methods, and expectations provided by the Projections Managing Partnership in consultation with the U.S. Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration.

Projections apply a range of statistical models to determine short-term industrial trends, which affect the occupational projections. Due to confidentiality rules, some occupational data are not on this list but are part of the Major Group subtotals and Totals, All Occupations.

In general, projections assume the following as true over the projected two-year period:

- · Work patterns will not change considerably
- · Social and educational trends in general will carry on
- Economic activity fluctuations due to the business cycle will continue
- There will be no major recession
- There will be no major war nor significant change in the size of the Armed Forces

The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic during the projection time period are not fully known. If further significant economic or public health changes occur in the coming months, these assumptions may not hold, thus potentially causing the future employment numbers to vary significantly from these projections.

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
